This giclee reproduction is the latest installation of an initiative to recreate the principal artwork that Freer commissioned for his home. While the originals now reside at the Freer Gallery of Art, Smithsonian Institution, the Freer House is using innovative giclee reproduction technology to recreate the paintings with their Stanford White designed frames, and re-installing these works in their original settings. The giclee process transfers high resolution digital photos onto canvas using quality archival inks to achieve color accuracy on the textured surface.

Tryon's final painting for the front hall of Charles L. Freer's home was painted several years after Tryon's decorative paint work on the interior wall surfaces had been completed and his other seven canvasses hung on the first floor, main hall. Commissioned for the second floor landing, *Early Spring* was visible from multiple sightlines, challenging Tryon to create a work that could stand alone while harmonizing with his other paintings. Freer was very pleased with the work, claiming that without it "the others would lack a guardian-like leader." With Freer's encouragement, Tryon exhibited *Early Spring* before sending it to Detroit. The painting received praise at the Fine Arts Academy of Buffalo where it was shown in the spring exhibition of 1897, and shortly after won a medal from the Carnegie Gallery in Pittsburgh.
