Teaching Tolerance: Value Your Child's Thoughts and Opinions

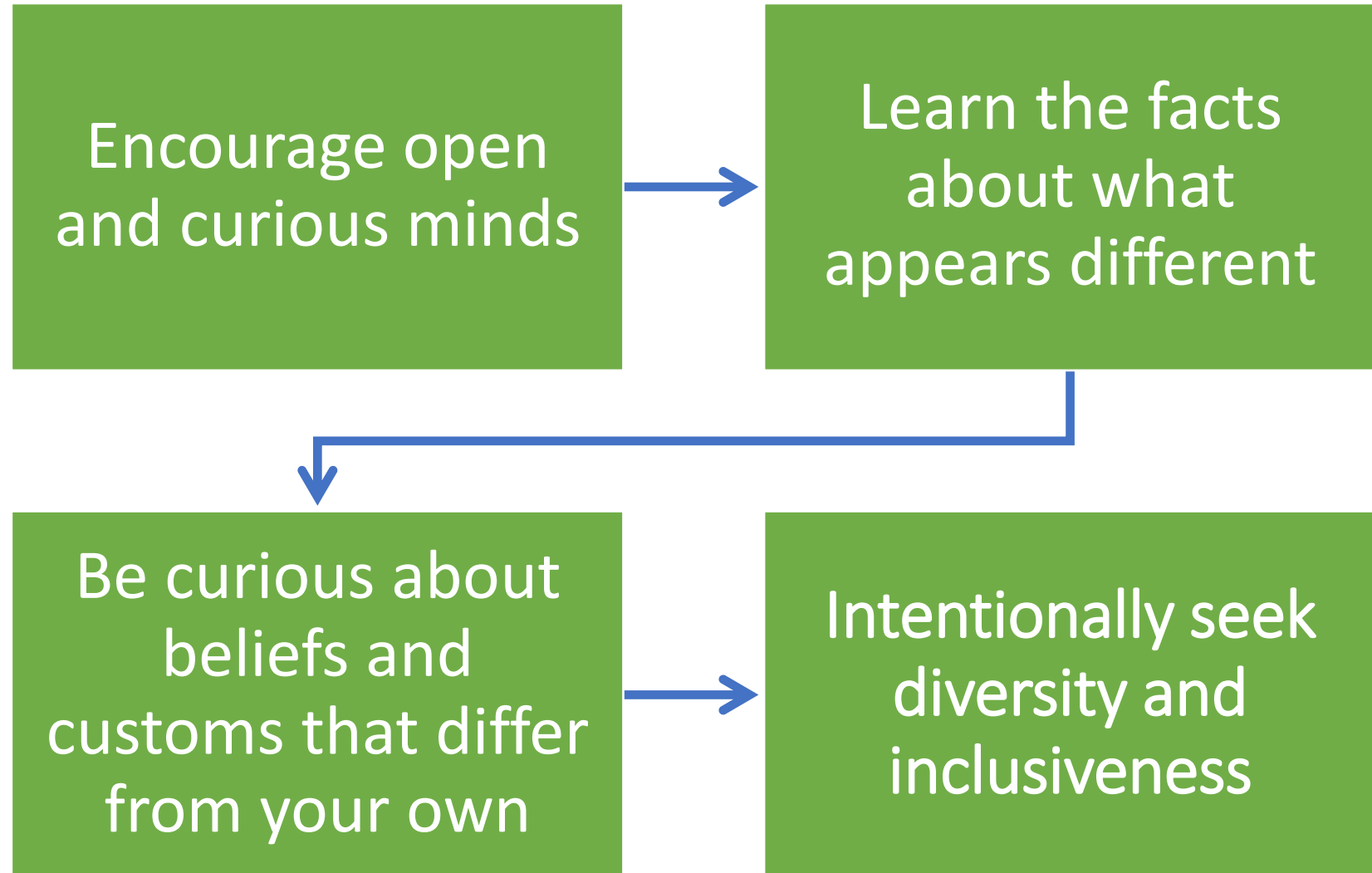


- Listen
